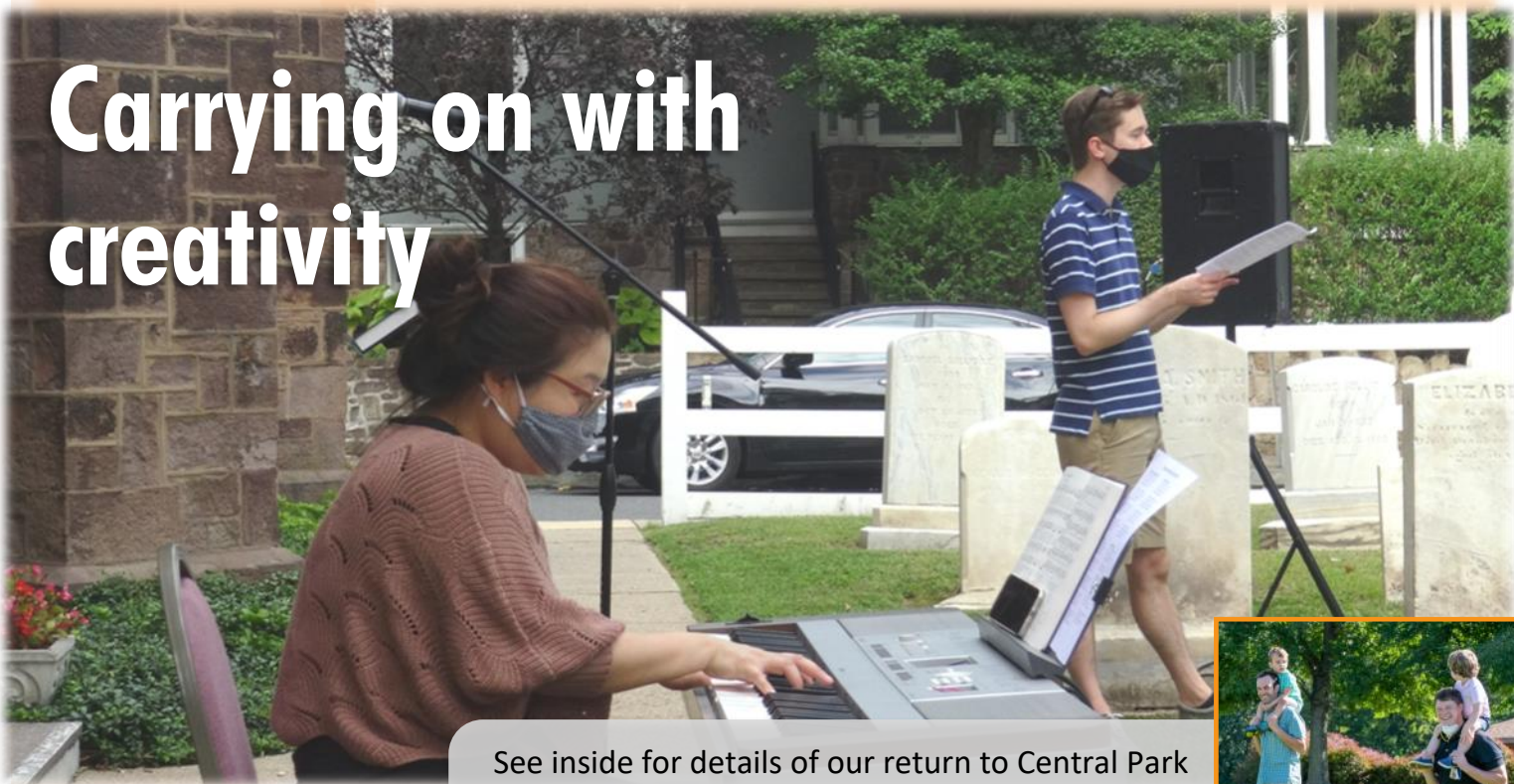

FROM the PASTOR

Every family has happy and sad times; moments of celebration and loss. It is also true that one of my great privileges as a pastor comes when invited into such tender occasions for others as the officiant at a wedding, baptism, or funeral. What occurs far less frequently are those moments when the personal and professional sides of my life intersect and I preside at such milestone events in my own family. Let me quantify just how rare such occasions have been.

Through the end of 2019, I had led or assisted at 144 weddings in my thirty-three years of ordained ministry, but only thirteen of those events involved a bride or groom related to me. I had presided or helped with 263 funerals during that same stretch of time with just ten of them being occasions celebrating the life of a family member. I had officiated at 316 baptisms during those years as well, but only twice for someone with whom I have any DNA in common. I offer all of that background as numerical evidence of yet another way this year has been unusual.

It began in January when my oldest cousin died and I officiated at his funeral, occurring in the church where I served as pastor for eleven years before coming to DPC. The following month, I placed the waters of baptism on my grandson in our sanctuary, just as I had done with his big sister four years earlier. In July, I led a graveside service in western New York to honor the amazing woman who was my mother-in-law for three decades and then last month, I was both father of the bride and co-officiant at the first street wedding in DPC history. Two of those moments occurred pre-COVID 19 and two bore the clear effect of this pandemic both in regards to timing and location. All of them were emotionally rich and profoundly meaningful.

Some pastors choose not to blur the role of family member and pastor in such occasions wanting in the case of my events only to be the grieving cousin or proud grandfather, thankful son-in-law or beaming father. I completely understand such reasoning for at the baptism of our children I was the father who stood with Lori and answered the questions posed to us by a clergy friend who then offered the sacrament itself. Yet I have no regrets in choosing a different role in recent family events, due both to what they allowed me to say and what those times said to me.

For when I led the funeral celebrating Don's 69 years on this earth, I was comforted again by the "old,

old story of Jesus and his love." When I placed water three times on Benjamin's head, I received tangible proof once more that we serve a God whose faithfulness endures from generation to generation. When I commended the soul of Rowena to her Maker, I was also blessed by the reminder that in life and in death we all belong to God. And when I pronounced Bryan and Emsley "husband and wife," I celebrated not only the love they had found in the other, but how all of us received God's love before we took our first breath.

Certainly not all of you have the same vocational opportunities, but we all have moments when our personal and professional lives can reveal the nature of God's care and presence and call. We all have times at milestone events when the words speak not only to the honoree, but to ourselves. Thus, while like many of you, I am ready for 2020 to end due to all of the challenges and disruption it has brought, I hope that in its last quarter you remain attentive to the enduring work of our Creator in your life and that of others. All in such a way that you might celebrate the fact that you are an integral part of God's family, too, and thus claim anew the blessing of that gift.

PEACE & JUSTICE COMMITTEE



"So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them, male and female he created them....God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good" Gen 1: 27 and 32

In a 2018 sermon delivered at the National Cathedral, the Rev. Dr. William J. Barber II said, "I still believe in the prophetic power of the Bible – a book my father said you can't read honestly without also making a commitment to work for justice."

In May of 2020 the police killing of George Floyd awakened the conscience of many to the racial injustice that has permeated our country since the first slaves were brought to the Virginia colony in 1619. One result of this and other killings was mass protests that were organized across the country. Folks in our congregation

also wanted to make sense of this. To facilitate this, John Willingham hosted six gatherings for members to join in conversations about race. In addition, with the support of the Peace and Justice Committee, a small group of women acted on a PC(USA) initiative to host a Week of Action to focus awareness on racial inequality. In these ways the issue of racial injustice was being raised and thought about in our church.

The Covid-19 pandemic has made it difficult to have in person classes concerning the history of racism in our country and to seek out people of color to learn about their experiences of living in a racist society. However, we believe it is of vital importance to hear the voices of those marginalized by racial injustice. Therefore, we encourage everyone to learn more through the written words of people of color.

To the books on racism that Peace and Justice had already added to the church library, we recommend several more written by people of color.

Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents by Isabel Wilkerson

The Third Reconstruction: How A Moral Movement Is Overcoming the Politics of Division and Fear by The Reverend Dr. William J. Barber II

How to Be an AntiRacist by Ibram X. Kendi

The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration In The Age of Colorblindness by Michelle Alexander

Peace and Global Witness Offering. October 4

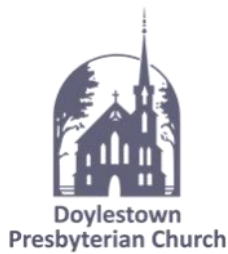
Church Mouse Program Seeking Mice and College Students!

IMPORTANT TAX INFORMATION FOR DPC MEMBERS OVER 70½ WITH IRAs

Tax legislation in 2018 increased the standard deduction while limiting benefits related to itemizing deductions. The law also added a new provision for charitable giving called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) for donations made from your IRA. If you are over the age of 70 and ½, you may want to look into making annual distributions from your IRA. Even though there are no Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) requirements for 2020 due to the CARES Act, you may still make a QCD. Normally a RMD or optional distribution of a larger amount is taxed as ordinary income. However, the QCD provision allows up to \$100,000 (per spouse) of IRA distributions to be made TAX FREE as long as they are directed to a qualified 501(c)(3) charitable organization like DPC. This applies whether you itemize or take the standard deduction. The check must be issued directly to the charity from the institution holding your IRA, and completed by December 31st of the tax year. It's usually done on a signed directive (a form provided by the financial institution).

To take advantage of this opportunity for the 2020 tax year contact your tax advisor or financial institution for advice well before the December 31 deadline. It is also possible to pay a 2021 pledge in 2020 to realize the QCD benefit in this tax year.
