

FROM the PASTOR

As part of its February meeting, the Session approved DPC becoming a Matthew 25 church. That designation means we understand our calling as followers of Jesus Christ is to be active in the world around us. Thus, your officers voted to become part of that denominational initiative

(www.presbyterianmission.org/ministries/matthew-25/). The name derives from that chapter of Matthew's gospel and in particular the verses where Jesus speaks about our responsibility towards the "least of these who are my brothers and sisters."

The next month, our leaders appointed a task force composed of a representative from each of the standing committees of Session and two at-large members of the congregation to consider and recommend a proposed emphasis for DPC. The PCUSA suggestions were that we focus on one of three themes: building congregational vitality, dismantling structural racism, or eradicating systemic poverty. The decision was completely up to us. After six months of prayer and study, listening and exploration together our task force recommended in October and the Session approved a DPC focus on dismantling racism and its intersectionality with poverty. The task force was not dissolved afterwards, but asked to develop a process for coordinating Matthew 25 efforts moving forward. The team enthusiastically agreed and that work has now begun.

I firmly believe it to be the right decision for this moment in time. National events of recent months have made it clear that injustice growing out of racism continues to plague our land and its citizens. In the six gatherings I held over the summer after the death of George Floyd, in my Growth Group underway now, and countless informal conversations in-between, members of DPC have repeatedly asked "How can we be part of the change?" While there are no easy answers for a problem that is visible and insidious, widespread and personal, it is the kind of challenge to which we are called if there is to be a different future.

To help provide a shared Biblical context for the work ahead, my sermons for the first three Sundays of November will focus on the 25th chapter of Matthew's gospel. Those verses contain three parables from Jesus that we will consider in turn. As

is true of the entirety of Scripture, I expect diverse and faithful conclusions within our community about what our Savior would want us to know and do, just as there will be wide-ranging thoughts among our members about how we best focus on the challenge of racism in our land and in our hearts.

> Even so, while I cannot predict where any of these conversations will lead, I remain confident that as long as we remain open to the leading of God's Spirit and are equally committed to staying in relationship with each other even when we disagree, that the path forward will become clear. Thus, I'm eager to continue that vital work together and to discover with you how we can be part of the change.

AT ITS MEETING THE SESSION:

- Approved the recommendation of the Matthew 25 Task Force that the focus for DPC be to work on dismantling racism and its intersection with poverty
- Requested that the task force develop a plan for implementation and church-wide efforts related to the goal
- Approved a revised staff model that includes the search for an Associate Pastor whose focus will be on educational and family ministries; requested the Nominating Committee to prepare a proposed slate for an Associate Pastor Nominating Committee to present to the congregation for election
- Approved donating \$14,000 from the COVID-19 Assistance Fund to groups that work directly with issues of food security
- Approved changes in the roll. Total membership as of 10/26 is 1478



Code Blue Update. We are sad to share that DPC will not be hosting Code Blue this year after nearly 10 years of hosting this important ministry each February. Due to COVID safety restrictions, the shelter will need to be set up in individual sections separated by plexiglass, which will need to be left up permanently for the month the shelter is in residence. Fellowship Hall is the only space large enough, which would have meant DPC would lose the use of this space and would also displace Building Blocks Preschool and Jazzercise. While we did not make this decision lightly, we made it knowing that Our Lady Guadalupe Catholic Church would be able to fill in as a host shelter for this year without displacing any of its programs.

Community Meal. During the COVID pandemic, the regular Meal has been suspended; however meals continue to be served on the third Sunday to our homeless guests. If you would like further information about helping with the meal, please inquire here: **bit.ly/DPC-Meal-Info** **St. Bernard Project Work Trip Scheduled.** A group of nine DPC'ers returned to the Jersey Shore last month to volunteer with St. Bernard Project, an organization helping to restore homes on the Jersey Shore damaged by Hurricane Sandy. We helped with sheet rocking, spackling, and flooring in a home that

During these gatherings, we will be looking to scripture and exploring students' identities and character strengths, capitalizing on those strengths and building positive, deeper relationships with those inside and outside our doors.

As we enter Advent

This current time is one of deep divisions between people – friends, even families, have been unable to reconcile the differences they experience.

And yet, in the midst of these dark times, November 29 marks the beginning of our yearly wait for the arrival of the One we call the Prince of Peace. As we prepare our hearts and minds for the birth of Jesus, the Peace and Justice Committee believes that reconciliation is possible. We look to the *Book of Confessions* and "A Brief Statement of Faith" to affirm this.

As you know, in 1983 the current Presbyterian Church (USA) was formed by the reunion of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America and the Presbyterian Church in the United States. The 80 lines of the resulting confession "celebrates our rediscovery that for all our undoubted diversity, we are bound together by a common faith and a common task."

In the spirit of hope, the Peace and Justice Committee shares these lines from "A Brief Statement of Faith:"

"In a broken and fearful world the Spirit gives us courage to pray without ceasing, to witness among all peoples to Christ as Lord and Savior, to unmask idolatries in Church and culture, to hear the voices of peoples long silenced, and to work with others for justice, freedom, and peace. In gratitude to God, empowered by the Spirit, we strive to serve Christ in our daily tasks and to live holy and joyful lives, even as we watch for God's new heaven and new earth, praying, 'Come, Lord Jesus!'"
