## **Celebrating Suren**

We thank Suren Mamedov, who retires after nearly three decades as "far more than sexton."

When Suren Mamedov was first hired as DPC's Sexton back in October of 1993, the church's longtime pastor Dr. William Barger jokingly described the job as "a piece of cake."

Of course, caring for a historic building that dates back to 1872 — not to mention Andrews Hall across the street — was anything but easy.

Add to that a significant language barrier and the stresses of making a new life for his family after arriving in the United States less than two years prior, and you can understand why the expression puzzled Suren.

"I said to my wife, 'What is a piece of cake?'" he recalled recently with a laugh.

But soon enough, Suren got the hang of the work. All the while he built relationships within DPC and soon felt part of the church family. Fast forward nearly 30 years and Suren has reached his retirement, set to step away from his career at the end of December.

Though most of his work was behind the scenes —



keeping the buildings clean, setting up for special events, and performing all sorts of handiwork — Suren also became a front-and-center-fixture, his smiling face often the first familiar sight people would see when attending worship service or stopping by the office.

## FROM the PASTOR

me thinking...

One day.

Our return to in-person worship lasted all of one Sunday, Our Re-Opening Task Force had planned exceptionally well for that morning and the volunteer teams all carried out their roles with precision and joy. It was wonderful to see the sixty or so other persons who joined us on that beautiful November day to offer our praise of God and the 300 households who participated via the livestream. It was a great occasion. Two days later, the task force and I met again to talk gathering in the about what we had learned that morning and to make adjustments for the following Sunday, but then began to discuss the troubling trend in COVID cases. We met again the next day and with the latest data in hand chose to return to livestream only for the foreseeable future.

While that shift was a disappointment for all of us, that lone time of gathering in the sanctuary got me thinking about other moments in life that happen only once, but still prepare us for what is ahead. Our birth happens only once of course, but sets in motion all of the discoveries and growth in the years that follow. A baptism happens only once as well, but it marks a unique beginning by the recipient for deepening faith. Graduation happens only once from a particular educational institution, too, but it moves us ahead to further studies or a vocational life. All kinds of significant things occur one time, but set the stage for what follows.

As people of faith, we are gearing up this month for one of those events. To be sure, for anyone who can read these words, Christmas 2020 will not mark the first time they have observed that moment. Most of us have traditions that return each December which build up to and then mark the joy of the season. Given the challenges of the coronavirus, I suspect that some of those traditions will be adjusted. Yet at the heart of all the planning and shopping, caroling and wrapping that will fill these weeks, we mark again an event that happened once.

The gospel writers tell that story. "And she gave birth to her firstborn son," Luke records "and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger." "And the Word became flesh," John adds "and lived among us." One day that forever changed all of our days.

So as we near the time of celebrating Christmas again, instead of focusing primarily on the ways that this virus has interrupted the rhythm of life, let's make it a time when we give thanks as never before for the greatest interruption of all that occurred in Bethlehem long ago. As it was that single day which continues to guide and bless us, while we are unable to worship together in person, once that joyful moment returns, and all the days inthat lone time of between.

It was smiling, Suren says, that helped him communicate initially. The sincere expression of warmth, he remembers, is what first struck him about those DPC members who greeted him and wife Svetlana, her mother Roza Karamyan, and his two sons Vladimir and Marat back in 1991. The family is of Armenian descent and lived in Azerbaijan before fleeing to Moscow due to escalating political conflict.

"Everybody in the church would come and smile," Suren said. "We didn't know people but here they are smiling. It was a different kind of life."

DPC's Mission Committee would later help reunite Suren with his parents, co-sponsoring their relocation to the US in 1996.

Doris Kodikian, a former Mission Committee member who also has Armenian heritage, was instrumental in arranging for the Mamedovs to move here.

"I was there at the airport when Suren and his family arrived. We've become family friends through the years. He calls me his sister," Doris said recently. "Every Sunday I would arrive for worship and he'd be there to give me a cheery hello. He's just a jovial man; warm and hospitable. It was heartwarming to see him become a fabric of this church family."

Pastor John Willingham says Suren has been "far more than sexton" during his years at DPC.

"He has been a valued colleague in ministry, the unofficial greeter to anyone who came inside our building, and one who brought dedication and humor to all that he did," he continued. "While I celebrate this new chapter in his life and give thanks to God for the journey together, I will miss him."
