

# **Expanding Your Antiracist Toolbox**

Racism is a very complex issue with many parts to learn about. The resources listed below are meant to help you explore different viewpoints, perspectives, and information about race, history, and privilege, and to aid in understanding different points of view. We encourage you to listen, read, and watch as many items as you are able at your own pace. Share them with each other, talk to friends and family, ask questions, and reflect.



## WATCH

Racial History in America, A look at history by Veggie Tales creator Phil Vischer about issues affecting black Americans after the Civil War to the present and answering the question, "Why are people so angry?" (17 minutes)

<u>Racial History in America - Part 2</u>, A follow-up to "Racial History in America" looking at the role of the black family and America's welfare system and misperceptions surrounding those. (26 minutes)

<u>The Disturbing History of the Suburbs</u>, An "Adam Ruins Everything" episode that quickly and humorously educates how redlining came to be. (6 minutes)

**Racism is Real**, A split-screen video depicting the differential in the white and black lived experience. (3 minutes)

<u>Confronting 'intergroup anxiety': Can you try too hard to be fair?</u> Explores why we may get tongue tied and blunder when we encounter people from groups unfamiliar to us. (5 minutes)

<u>CBS News Analysis: 50 states, 50 different ways of teaching America's past</u>, Ibram X. Kendi reviews current history curriculum production and use across the U.S. (5 minutes)

<u>What Kind of Asian Are You?</u> Humorous two minute YouTube video that illustrates the utter silliness of the way many white Americans interact with Asian Americans. (2 minutes)

<u>Birth of a White Nation</u>, Keynote speech by legal scholar Jacqueline Battalora, offers a blow-by-blow description of the moment the idea of, and word for, "white" people entered U.S. legal code. (36 minutes)

<u>How to overcome our biases? Walk boldly toward them</u>, TED Talk by Vernā Myers, encourages work vigorously to counter balance bias by connecting with and learning about and from the groups we fear. (19 minutes)

Systemic Racism Explained, A short cartoon explaining what systemic racism is (4 minutes)
