

I suspect most of you have heard that inperson worship at DPC resumes on May 2. Like you, I am thrilled we can re-open our doors and safely be together again inside our sanctuary. During these months of livestream-only worship, the lay readers and deacons who gathered inside for a particular Sunday, Our worship experience and those who came into that space as will be different from part of our Holy Week observances all pre-COVID days and spoke of how meaningful it was to be thus want to speak to back in a room that holds such what it will be like, no significance and memory. Thus, to start matter what form you doing so on a weekly basis gives many more people that same opportunity and to see each other. For those who gather in the sanctuary, masks and social distancing will be required. The latter necessity may well mean you cannot sit in your favorite spot as the sanctuary capacity is capped currently at 100 persons; on Sundays when a larger number arrive, individuals will be directed to the Celtic Cross Room or Fellowship Hall where the service can be broadcast internally. The external doors will open at 9 to allow our team to be ready for your arrival. Wherever you are seated on our campus, the service will be a mix of live and pre-recorded moments. The Children's Message and many of the musical offerings, for instance, will be of the latter variety and projected onto the wall behind the choir loft. While I can promise you the preacher for the day will be physically present, other worship leaders may not. Also, because singing inside remains a risk we will only have one hymn each Sunday—the closing one.

For those of you who will continue to join us online, please be assured of my commitment to make it a worshipful experience for you as well. While it's true that prior to COVID, we would live-stream the service, basically in those days it was a broadcast of what was happening in the sanctuary. We have learned a lot during the past year about how to help persons worshiping remotely participate fully and those lessons will shape what happens moving forward. We will continue to show all of the responses and lyrics on the screen, elicit prayer concerns ahead of time, and when observing the Lord's Supper invite you to join us, too. The preacher will not be looking only at those in the room, but while scanning the room will continue to speak directly to the camera, too. We have developed a Digital Connect Card that will makes it easy for you to pass on information to us

and we have created the option of giving by text. All of those steps are meant to ensure you are fully part of that day's congregation as well.

> Thus, while many aspects of worship will not be the same as before, what will endure is our continuing resolve to provide ways for all who gather—inperson or online—to offer their praise, to experience the life-giving nature of God's Word and presence, and to find ever-more faithful ways to respond to the Good News of Jesus Christ. Thus, however you join us in the coming weeks, know of my anticipatory joy once more in sharing that experience with you!



MISSION

Rolling Harvest Food Rescue. Rolling Harvest, a DPC Mission Budget supported organization, offers a number of volunteer opportunities at local farms to help with planting and harvesting surplus crops. These crops are then distributed to local food pantries and meal programs. Days and times that you can help with the harvesting vary depending on what crops are ready. There is a "standing" volunteer time on Saturday mornings from 9 am - 11 am at Gravity Hill Farm in Lambertville. You can sign up for the Rolling Harvest app and be notified of available times and go on your own. We would also like to organize some DPC days when a group of us can go, but they are often fairly short notice. If you would like to be on the contact list for these group days, you can sign up here: bit.ly/DPC-RH Rolling Harvest allows children 10 and over to volunteer. Pentecost Offering. Each spring, the PC(USA) collects the Pentecost Offering to support programs that nurture and encourage the faith of its young people and address the needs of at-risk children. Sixty percent of the offering is used to support ministries of the Presbyterian Mission Agency working with atrisk youth and the remainder is sent to a local organization chosen by the congregation.

The mission committee has chosen Hunting Park Christian Academy as the recipient of this year's Pentecost Offering. Hunting Park is located in a diverse, inner city neighborhood of northern Philadelphia. The funds will go directly to their scholarship fund, which makes a high-quality, faith-based education accessible to all students regardless of their family's income.

The offering falls at the same time as HPCA's annual "Race for Education," which will be held on **May 5 - 6** and raises funds to support the school's scholarship fund. In addition to supporting HPCA through our yearly mission budget and special opportunities like the Pentecost Offering, DPC pledged to provide four

Hunting Park students with an almost full scholarship for grades Pre-K through eighth grade as part of our first capital campaign nine years ago. Our sponsored students are now in 7th grade and have one more year left at HCPA! We are so grateful to have the opportunity to support children in our community – all of whom deserve a quality education.

For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat... New Record Alert!! Thanks to your amazing donations, 1,580 pounds of food and \$300 in grocery gift cards were collected for the Bucks County Housing Group during April's food drive. These totals are the highest since we began the monthly drives in October! In addition, as we slowly begin to return to the "Community Meal" on a hand-out basis for now, 24 meals were prepared and \$375 in gift cards to area restaurants were donated for our homeless friends. This was all possible because of your incredible generosity. DPC holds its food drive on the 3rd Sunday of each month from 10:30 - 11:30 am on Mechanics Street.



New Interim Director of Tweens and Teens Carrie Biermann has been out and about, getting to know the DPC community! She helped out all morning at the April food drive and is working hard to help organize the May 9 Youth Sunday worship service. In her efforts to get to know our 4th through 12th-graders, Carrie has begun sending a weekly digital newsletter called "What's Up Wednesday?!?!?" The emails will service as a great way to connect with tweens, teens, youth leaders, and parents to shape this ministry together!



In volume 1, Carrie described the "Intro to the Bible Challenge," which includes chances to win fun prizes, and previewed awesome outdoor outings, featuring Movies in the Park, Capture the Flag, and Zombies vs Humans! Focus on Facilities

The Property Committee is charged with identifying the needs of DPC to preserve and protect the functionality, beauty, and history of our church campus. There are several significant, pending facility repair projects that the Property Committee is researching. In order to spread awareness about the items, we would like to share the following information:



<u>Sanctuary Stained Glass</u> <u>Windows:</u>

Many of the windows in the Sanctuary are exhibiting significant deterioration and out-ofplane buckling such that a major restoration is required. We have been studying this issue over the past year, and several remediation cost estimates

have been obtained from Stained Glass Restoration Specialists. The current condition is not a life-safety issue, but continued deterioration and inaction will inevitably lead to further degradation that could significantly compound the issue and increase the cost for the congregation. Current estimates to rehabilitate all the problematic windows are in the range of \$130,000, or \$60,000 for an initial phase to address only the most deteriorated windows.

Parking Lot Restoration:

The Parking lot has started to deteriorate and could be a safety issue. The need to have it completely resurfaced should be done in the next year. This would include milling, paving and relining the current space. An estimated cost is around \$69,000.

Painting of the Sanctuary Exterior Trim:

The trim on the exterior trim of the Sanctuary (especially second story and above) is beginning to peel and show exposed woodwork. We are working to get estimates to repaint the trim and also repair a small roof leak near the steeple. The estimated cost could be around \$35,000. Maintaining the sanctuary trim and mitigating water infiltration will avoid other significant cost for the congregation.



Graveyard Maintenance:

DPC is blessed to have a historic graveyard (circa 1815) which is also the gateway to our church. Many early citizens of Doylestown are buried there, resulting in community interest and frequent visitors. A team of volunteers have worked hard over the last three years to preserve and document the memorials. Many repairs are needed - ten headstones have been identified for immediate action due to safety and other issues. Quotes range between \$3,600

and \$6,900.

Organ Computer System Upgrade:

We have been informed by our Organ maintenance company that we will need to replace the organ's control system (computer circuit board) in the next couple years. The control system is currently 21 years old and as with all electronics, it will soon be time to upgrade. This will be a significant cost but we are waiting for the actual estimate.

The Property Committee will be working with the Finance Committee to look for ways to finance these projects in the coming year or two, if possible.
