- A Conversation with Pastor Mac

The following is a chat between Pastor Mac and Worship, Music & the Arts moderator Mark Strasburg.

Mark: So Mac, why is in-person worship at DPC so meaningful to you?

Mac: For me, worship is a weekly reminder that something bigger than myself is at the center of the universe, aka the Triune God. I feel that worship produces thanksgiving, peace, joy and communal hope. I think the ritual and rhythm of it is very important in a world that throws us out of sync. Mark, why is in-person worship important to you?

Mark: After a hectic week, I enjoy the rich time I spend in worship with my church family. It's a wonderful way to stay connected to those I care about. I learn about their lives and if there's anything I can do to help. It's also an opportunity to meet new people and strengthen my church community.

Each of us has our own unique relationship with God, but worshipping with others brings us together and helps us grow in our faith. It's a way to share our faith with others and learn from each other. Mac, why is it important we are still livestreaming worship after the pandemic?

Mac: It's most important for people who cannot physically come to worship anymore to remain connected to the community of faith they love and, in many cases, poured their life into. It's also useful for people recovering from illness who are temporarily away from in-person worship. I know some who like to worship through the livestream when they are on vacation or a business trip. But in those cases I also think it's good to visit another church in-person to see how other communities worship. Mark, I know you listen to the *DPC Podcast*, why do you like that?

Mark: I wish I could attend worship every Sunday, but it's not always possible. Having other ways to stay connected to the church is really helpful. Whether it's listening to a missed sermon or following along with a sermon series, it keeps me in sync with the others who were in worship. I usually listen when I take an evening walk. Sometimes, I even re-listen to a sermon because I want to think about a particular passage more deeply. Any last words from you, Pastor Mac?

Mac: Only that as summer comes and we move to 9:30 am worship, if you're in town and physically able to do so, I hope you'll commit to the rhythm and ritual of in-person worship. As Psalm 118:24 says, "This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it."

The Music of BENEDICT SHEEHAN



DPC is thrilled to welcome composer and conductor **Benedict Sheehan on May 18 at 4:00 pm** as he leads the DPC Chancel Choir and the Bucks County Ecumenical Choir in the next concert of the Celebrate the Arts series.

As we look ahead to the performance, DPC's Director of Communications Christian Menno shares his experience in meeting Benedict late last month...



Recently, Benedict visited the church to lead the singers in another round of evening rehearsals and I was there to meet him and conduct a video interview (keep watch for that soon).

As I waited for his arrival, the anticipation grew. His list of accomplishments is honestly kind of intimidating. He is a three-time GRAMMY-nominee and American Prize Winner, who has been called "one of the leading voices in religious classical music in the 21st century," and whose pieces have been performed by ensembles all over the world. I felt a twinge of nervousness when choir member Joanne Morris leaned to my ear and whispered, "he really is a master."

Then Benedict appeared. Within a few moments, all my anxiety melted away. I quickly felt at ease with this softspoken man who emanated kindness and humility. Having seven daughters (you read that right) has a way of affecting a person, he joked. Benedict has made the rehearsals family affairs, bringing wife Talia (who grew up in DPC) and some of his daughters. As the interview progressed, Benedict talked about living with a significant stutter - a subject he has been open about. This speech difference has in many ways shaped his ability to write music and enhance his passion for the craft.

"What I try to do is listen," he said. "I listen to the sounds around me. I listen to the ways that people talk. As a person who has a stutter, it's always been a challenge for me to be able to talk the way I want to, but I think it also gives me an appreciation for the way language works and I'm often just deeply inspired by the sound of words and the way that sound can convey meaning."

It was a series of inspiring words written by his wife's late grandmother Miriam Montgomery that recently helped him compose a piece commissioned by DPC along with his mother-in-law and DPC member Susan Darville. The text was in the form of a poem written by Miriam, who was a beloved fixture at DPC for more than 70 years and passed away last year at age 102. She penned the poem when she was just 23-years-old in 1945 shortly after Germany surrendered to the Allied Forces. The poem (and now the choral/organ piece) is called Victory. The words implore the reader to pause in celebrating, and to reflect on the horrific realities of war, reminding us there is still work to be done to make the world a more caring place, rid of oppression.

The piece will be unveiled during the May 18 concert. No tickets are required and a free-will offering will be received to help support the Celebrate the Arts series at DPC. A reception will follow in the Celtic Cross Room.

"It's been a joy to be here and to work with this really dedicated chorus here at DPC," Benedict said. "They're such a friendly and joyful and yet skilled group of singers who give their whole hearts and souls to singing and just making a beautiful sound."



April Session Update



- The Session sustained the examination of the class of 2028 officers-elect. The ordination & installation of new elders & deacons will take place on Sunday, May 18 at both services. The officers-elect completed a four-session training with Pastor Mac in the month of April. The officers-elect presented beautiful and personal Statements of Faith for their examination.
- The Session received into membership by Profession of Faith Carina Dignetti who participated in the 2025 Confirmation Class joining on May 4.
- Upon the recommendation of the Finance & Property Standing Committee the session approved the retirement of two internal loans: A \$100,000 loan from the Mission Endowment Fund and \$92,800 loan from the Endowment Fund. This was made possible due to two generous bequests received by the church in the first quarter totaling \$399,078. These funds were originally borrowed in 2013 for a pre-payment on the construction loan and the second was in 2019 for mold remediation and repairs. Thanks be to God!
- The Session approved a recommendation by Christian Education Standing Committee to hire Dr. Peter Enns, a biblical scholar, author and co-host of the Bible for Normal People podcast. Dr. Enns will preach on Sunday, September 14 with a post worship discussion.
- The Session approved a recommendation from Membership, Connections & Outreach Standing Committee that former members who wish to rejoin the congregation are required to participate in at least the second Inquirer's Class (aka new members class).
- At a called meeting of Session on Sunday, April 27, Elders voted to receive seven new members.

Stated Meeting of The Presbytery of Philadelphia

On Tuesday, April 29, the Presbytery of Philadelphia had their stated meeting at Carmel Presbyterian Church in Glenside, PA. The Presbytery has four stated meetings a year. DPC's Session elected six commissioners to this meeting (pictured below). Pastor Becca & Mac are also voting members of the Presbytery. At this meeting:

- We heard a report from Executive Presbyter Ruth Santana-Grace centering on Christ's resurrection work in the larger church.
- We voted on the 226th General Assembly proposed amendments to the Book of Order.
- We prayed with and for the members of Berean Presbyterian Church who had a fire in their church.
- We welcomed the Reverend Jihyum Oh, Stated Clerk of the General Assembly and Executive Director of the Interim Unified Agency of the PC(USA). She preached during worship.



Special thanks to our commissioners for carving out a large portion of the day to serve the larger church and discern the mind of Christ together.



The DPC Operating Fund is moving along in good shape. With the first quarter of 2025 behind us, the Finance Subcommittee is pleased to report that total income was slightly over budget by \$20,004 and expenses were slightly under budget by \$26,493. Thanks to the continuous generosity of DPC members and friends, we are on target to meet our financial obligations for the year.

In addition to the Operating Fund, DPC has three Legacy Funds: (Memorials, Bequests and Gifts, Endowment and Mission Endowment). While all of the Legacy Funds are important, there was a significant change in one of them this past quarter. We are pleased to report that DPC received almost \$400,000 in bequests in the first quarter. These undesignated bequests are set aside in the General Purpose Fund of the Memorials, Bequests, and Gifts Fund (MBG Fund) for special projects that fall outside of the annual budget for enhancements or innovative programs that creatively support the mission statement of DPC. Thanks be to God for these faithful saints for these gifts to DPC.
