

Mac's Meanderings We Don't Want to Assume You Know

Some of you have been around churches for a while and you know about the financial underpinnings and structure. For others, this is completely new. I thought I'd write a few "101" details about this as we enter the 2026 Generosity Campaign. So here goes:

- 1. The 2026 Generosity Campaign asks people to pledge a percentage of their time, abilities, and financial resources to Christ through the local church.
- 2. A **"pledge"** of a certain dollar amount from each household allows the church leadership to plan for the upcoming year's **annual budget**. This budget covers costs for worship, education, fellowship, mission/outreach, and congregational care. Our staff, volunteers, and building facilitate all these things.
- 3. Sometimes in worship we talk about presenting your "tithes and offerings." Tithe language comes from the Bible when, in a more agrarian society, farmers would bring 10% of the bounty of their fields to the temple in thanksgiving to God for the harvest. Although most of us are not farmers, we use tithe language to talk about returning to God a percentage of our household income. An "offering" was historically what one gave to God above and beyond their tithe.
- 4. We currently have 567 households who could potentially pledge. In 2024, 263 DPC households made a pledge to Christ's ministry through DPC. We hope to increase the number of households that pledge in 2026.
- 5. How much "time, talent, and treasure" you decide to pledge is a decision between you and God. **Small and large pledges are all important!**
- 6. DPC does not receive funds from the larger denomination (Presbyterian Church U.S.A.) to support its annual budget. DPC is totally reliant on your generosity and commitment.
- 7. Sometimes I use the phrase "prayerful discernment" when talking about pledging time, talent, and treasure. I know many of you are super busy, but I'd ask for you to listen to the campaign messages "prayerfully" and then "discern" what Christ is calling you to commit. Each of us needs to slow down and listen for the Spirit's wisdom regarding the resources we have been blessed with.

Thank you in advance for your care and commitment to Christ through the church!



September Session Update



The Session met three times in September:

- Twice to welcome three new members.
- Once for their stated meeting on Monday, September 22.

Here are the highlights from the stated meeting:

- Pastor Mac did training on serving the Lord's Supper and its history.
- Session discussed how their calls to the membership of the church went. Elders &
 Deacons called all the households in the church to:
 - Invite them to worship and brunch with Peter Enns,
 - Ask if members had a prayer request,
 - And to see if we could get updated photographs for our new online directory.
- Session approved a list of agreements they will abide by in their conversation and discernment at meetings. They are as follows:
 - Take space, make space;
 - Stay on your learning edge;
 - Challenge ideas, not people;
 - Oops, ouch, appreciation;
 - Take responsibility for impact;
 - Humor is okay.
- Session heard a report from Dennis Parenti, the elder liaison to the Generosity
 Sub-Committee. Elders were encouraged to make lead pledges for 2026 by
 October 20.
- Session approved making Earth Care Interest Group a Sub-Committee.
- Session approved a new hiring policy for the Personnel Policies & Procedures Manual.
- Session approved the selling of lithographs of Daniel Garber's Green Pastures painting as a fundraiser for planting native plants on the church property.
- Elders closed the meeting by discussing their reactions to Peter Enns' sermon and brunch conversation.

Many thanks to the congregation for their steadfast and faithful giving over the summer months. We typically experience a dip in giving during the summer months, but only saw signs of this in August this year. Our income (pledges, non-pledge and other income) through August is about \$23,000 below budget, and expenses are under budget by \$80,000.

We encourage you to keep up with your pledges either through online giving while you are away or by mailing a check to the office. If you are unsure where you stand with your pledge, you can contact Linay Richards in the office. She can let you know the balance remaining for the current pledge campaign that ends December 31, 2025. Join Matthew 25 Subcommittee for a special bus trip to Philadelphia with our friends from Second Baptist Church on Saturday, **November 15**, with the bus departing from the DPC parking lot at 8:45 am. Together we'll visit:

MOTHER BETHEL AME CHURCH, the mother church of the nation's first black denomination. Founded in 1787, the church rests upon the oldest parcel of land in the United States continuously owned by African-Americans.

AFRICAN AMERICAN MUSEUM IN PHILADELPHIA, the nation's first museum to capture the history of the African American community.

The cost is \$48 for adults, \$40 for children (age 12-18) and includes transportation, bus snacks, museum admissions, museum docents. Bring a bagged lunch to eat together in the museum. Keep watch for payment and registration details on **October 10**.

PDA and Buckets of Blessings. One of the key tools Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) uses in its response to natural disasters is the "emergency response bucket"-- five-gallon buckets filled with essential cleaning and recovery supplies.

These "Buckets of Blessings" provide tangible support to families facing the difficult work of rebuilding their lives. DPC's Mission Committee is collecting the items to fill 10 buckets. At Advent All Together on November 30 we will assemble the Buckets for delivery to the Presbytery offices, to be transported to the national offices in Louisville.



Peace and Global Witness Special Offering - October 5. On World Communion Sunday, the PC(USA) sponsors this collection for peacemaking and global witness work worldwide, regionally, and locally.

This year our local project is our mission partner, Welcoming the Stranger, an educational non-profit that since 1999 has offered free classes in English as a Second Language (ESL), computer skills, and United States citizenship exam preparation to adult immigrants and refugees in the Philadelphia metro region. "I was a stranger and you welcomed me" (Matthew 25:35).

"Little did we imagine when the Coalition to Shelter and Support the Homeless (CSSH) asked if DPC would host a Community Meal on the third Sunday of each month what God had in store for us. From the first Meal in October, 2015 until now, the outpouring of support from both the congregation and community has been nothing short of incredible. For 10 years, each month's SignUpGenius fills so quickly that no phone calls for help have ever been made. Even during Covid, the meals continued each month in takeout containers handed out in the alley behind Andrews Hall - but still our congregation provided the needed food every month. What began as a ministry for our homeless guests has resulted in a great blessing for everyone involved ... volunteers and those coming to enjoy the meal alike."
