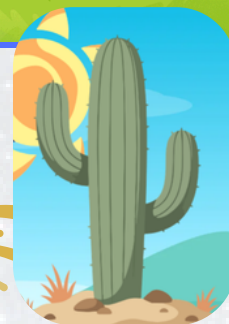

Mac's Meanderings

Is Summer the Best Season for Church?

For a number of years now, both here in PA and in my time as pastor in NC, I've had a strong feeling that summer is THE BEST season for church and faith.

Why do I say this?

I feel like people are hanging on for dear life in the fall. Everyone gets slammed with everything from work to school to sports leagues and more. Sometimes it's November before people get a grip on a new rhythm because things are so hectic.

This is why I love summer for church and faith. It seems to me that individuals and families finally have some room in their schedule to breathe. While I would want all seasons to have windows for people to make room for their Christian faith and spiritual rhythms, I believe summer is the best time to create and begin spiritual practices. It's a time to make space for spiritual grounding to listen for Christ's call in your life; to re-evaluate what is important and what keeps you sane.

The church offers lots of things in the summer that allow you to focus on the priority of Christian discipleship. This newsletter is filled with them. And why should it be a priority? I have tons of reasons:

- At your core you are a child of God.
- It is God who has provided you with any good thing, so it makes sense to carve out time to thank God for what is good in your life.
- Focusing on growth in our faith helps us see what is most important in life.
- Becoming spiritually literate makes us hungry for God in our life.
- God created us to be in community and the church is filled with amazing people who help us see God more fully.

Just in June, July and August all sorts of things happened and will happen to deepen our faith:

- 8 different Growth Groups reading James Martin's Jesus Pilgrimage book
- 14 people on pilgrimage to Scotland/England
- 35 adults at Summer Spiritual Renewal focused on the great hymns of the church
- 55 children coming to VBS with 37 volunteer leaders
- 14 High Schoolers headed to Montreat Summer Conference
- Middle Schoolers gearing up for summer mission week
- New people leading worship through summer choir
- All of us worshipping together at one service at 9:30 a.m. every Sunday!

I encourage you to use the breathing space of summer to celebrate God's gift of life so when things get wild in the fall, your schedule doesn't become your god, but the God of the universe does!

June Session Update



The Session had their stated meeting on June 22nd. The following took place:

- This was the first official meeting with the new class of elders.
- Deacon Moderator Steve Quist came to Session to give elders an update on ongoing and new Deacon ministries.
 - Deacons are now present at memorial services to greet guests, give directions, provide hospitality and support the families.
 - Deacons are now sending quarterly grief booklets to members who have had a loss of a loved one.
 - Deacons will be having a retreat in October to talk about the topic of listening with Doylestown Hospital Director of Pastoral Care Rev. Maggie Ainslie.
 - The Deacons may partner with Connections Committee to put on an educational event in '26-'27.
 - Deacons are now providing inspirational booklets on a variety of subjects to help individuals heal mind, body and spirit. They are available in a display case on the bridge.
 - A Deacon will come to Session every other month to report in the upcoming year.
- Session approved 4 baptisms.
- Session approved having Nate Stucky of Princeton Theological Seminary Farminary (<https://ptsem.edu/academics/departments/farminary/>) facilitate an off-campus event on October 16th called "Wine and the Word."
- Session was informed that the Presbytery of Philadelphia has approved the new lease agreements for Building Blocks Learning Center and Jazzercise.
- Five elders were approved to serve as commissioners at the Stated meeting of Presbytery on July 25th at Salt & Light Church in Philadelphia.
- Session will not meet for a stated meeting in July.

ST. CUTHBERT'S WAY PILGRIMAGE

From June 3rd to 14th, 14 members and friends of DPC went on a pilgrimage from Melrose, Scotland to Lindisfarne, England along St. Cuthbert's Way. This was a 68 mile trek along the ancient border of these two countries. The first six days were hiking. The longest day was 17 miles. The shortest 7 miles. The group spent two days on the holy island of Lindisfarne worshipping, enjoying creation, learning history, exploring the island and sharing in fellowship. On June 12th they went on a boat trip to the Farne Islands, now a summer bird nesting sanctuary, but also the ancient home to hermit St. Cuthbert.

The group concluded their pilgrimage at Durham Cathedral. The cathedral was built for the remains of St. Cuthbert. Our final activity there was a meeting with the director of their new pilgrimage center, a tour of the cathedral and a moving morning prayer service at the grave of St. Cuthbert. During this time, groups of hometown hikers gathered at local parks and shared the same devotions with those overseas as part of the Parallel "Back Home" Walking Groups!

REFLECTIONS

When I reflect on the pilgrimage hike along St. Cuthbert's Way, I'm full of gratitude. I'm thankful to have had the opportunity to do it, for the fair weather that we had, and for the fact that all of us made it successfully with just some of the usual expected aches and pains.

This experience, just like a journey of faith, followed a path from *listening*, to *deciding*, then *doing*. There were some questions and doubts of course (What to bring? Where would we sleep? How would our bodies hold up? Would there be bathrooms?). Along the way we met wonderful people, made new friendships, leaned on the support and prayers of others who were supporting us, and learned a lot of new things.

As with every new adventure there were uphill challenges, obstacles in the path (for us it was sheep and cows), unmarked trails and forks in the path, but the reward of beautiful expansive views were breathtaking and fulfilling.

I pray that wherever you are you remain open and receptive to opportunities that can challenge and excite you. That may not be a pilgrimage hike... it may simply be something right where you are – a mission project, small group, committee, a visit to someone who needs it. If you hear that call in some way, hopefully you can make the decision to do it and receive the support and fellowship of others along the way.

Scottish Communion July 19



We continue the beloved DPC tradition honoring our denomination's Scottish roots as we gather on **July 19** at 9:30 am during a unique time of worship. Together we share in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, enjoy music from a traditional Scottish ensemble, and gather for shortbread in the churchyard. Interested in sharing your own shortbread with the congregation? Just bring a batch to the church office during business hours during the week by July 15.

Shortbread Recipe

- 4 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 cups butter, softened
- 1 1/4 cup confectioners' sugar
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Into a large bowl, measure all ingredients. With hands, knead ingredients until well blended (dough will be soft). Pat down evenly into a 9x13" baking pan. With fork, prick dough in many places. Bake about 45 minutes or until golden. While still warm, cut into pieces. Remove when cool. Freezes well!



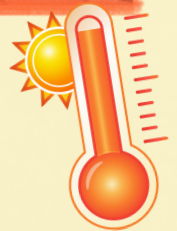

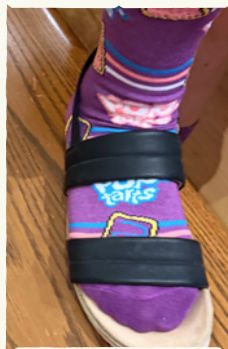

The Search for DPC's Next Youth Director

An Update from Pastor Becca Bateman

Our search for a full-time Youth Director continues, and we wanted to share an update with the congregation.

First, thank you to our Youth Director Search Task Force Meredith Gapsis, Larry King, and Andy Smith. Since December 2025, this dedicated group has invested countless hours reviewing applications, interviewing candidates, praying together, and discerning who God might be calling to this important ministry. We are deeply grateful for their commitment and care throughout this process.

Over the past several months, we have had the privilege of getting to know ten strong candidates. While we have met many gifted individuals, we have not yet found the right fit, for either the candidate or our congregation. As difficult as that can be, we remain committed to finding the right person rather than simply filling the position. This has also provided a wonderful opportunity for us to see the landscape of youth ministry in 2026 and helping ourselves to understand that a framework that sustained youth ministry in the past decades are not practices that will sustain youth ministry in the future. Youth do need space to be themselves and grow in their own faith and at the same time they need dependable relationships with adults who are willing to share their faith with them, that means worshiping alongside them, learning alongside them, and having fun alongside them. We invite you into this new framework as well as you will keep seeing youth involved in all of DPC as well as leaders needed to be in the youth space as well.

We also want to express our sincere thanks to Katy Schafer for faithfully serving as our Interim Youth Director. Her leadership has given us the gift of time to conduct a thoughtful search while continuing to provide meaningful ministry for our youth. A special thank you goes to our youth as well. Many of them have participated in interviews by taking part in "mock" youth group gatherings with candidates. While these weren't actual youth group meetings, the conversations, laughter, and relationships formed during those evenings were very real. Our students have represented our church with honesty, warmth, and enthusiasm, and their voices have been an important part of the search process.

As we move forward, we ask for your continued prayers for our search team, for the person God is preparing, and for our youth ministry during this season of discernment.

If you know someone who may be called to this ministry or would be a great fit for Doylestown Presbyterian Church, we would love to hear from you. Our Youth Director position description is available on the church website, and we welcome your recommendations and referrals.

We trust that God is already at work, and we look forward with hope to welcoming the right person when the time is right.
